Description: The course is designed to provide an overview of the steps taken within organizations to protect their cyber resources. It will also look at that protection within the context of the broader community. Participants will explore the impact of the interconnections and dependencies introduced by information technology.

Course Objectives

- Recognize various types of cyber threats and attacks
- Identify the dimensions and general structure of the Community Cyber Security Maturity Model (CCSMM)
- Recognize failures and successes in each of the CCSMM dimensions
- Identify how to improve those dimensions within their own community and/or organization
- Describe interdependencies associated with the CCSMM

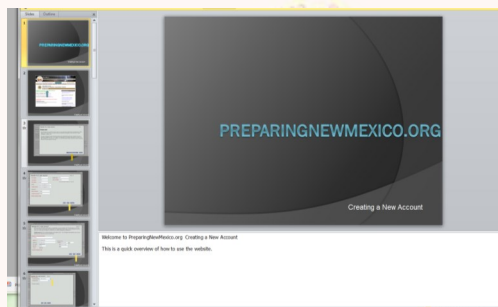
Description: The course provides individuals, community leaders and first-responders with information on how cyber attacks can impact, prevent, and/or stop operations and emergency responses in a community. It also serves as a cursory introduction to cyber threats, vulnerabilities and countermeasures. It explains vulnerabilities of computer systems and networks and how these vulnerabilities can affect communities. The course introduces actions communities can take in establishing a cyber security program.

Course Objectives

- Identify reasons why communities are vulnerable to cyber attack.
- Differentiate between the levels of cyber security threats.
- Recognize that terrorists are capable of, and planning to use, computers to attack American communities and citizens.
- Describe how everyone is affected by and has a role in cyber security efforts.
- List ways cyber can affect the physical world.
- Recognize the purpose of the Community Cyber Security Maturity Model.
- State one technique for enhancing security awareness among community leaders.
- Give one example of how a community can share cyber security-related information.
- Identify at least two kinds of exercises.
- Recognize that cyber security exercises are as important as other exercises to protect their organization, community, state and nation.

Introduction to Radiological and Nuclear Incident Response (IRNIR) Course

IRNIR Purpose and Goals IRNIR provides a foundation for advanced Defense Nuclear Weapons School courses. The two-day awareness course teaches basic radiation science, introduction to nuclear weapons and radiological dispersal devices, radiological terrorism, medical and psychological effects of ionizing radiation, and crisis communication. It also provides valuable information on radiation hazards, detection equipment, personal protective equipment, decontamination, and federal incident response. The goal is to increase student confidence and comfort level in responding to, and mitigating the consequences of, radiological accidents and terrorist WMD incidents.

Training and Exercise Programs Manual

Emergency management stakeholders,

The Training and Exercise Programs Manual had its first record of changes, primarily in relation to paperless classroom, exercise compliance, exercise waiver process, and new templates. Effective today, older templates will not be accepted. Note that the most significant changes are to the Request to Use Federal Grant Funds for Training, Conference, or Exercise Activities (inclusion of Multi-Year Training and Exercise Plan with each request) and After-Action Report / Improvement Plans template (sponsor funds and participant fields must be included even if a jurisdiction utilizes their own AAR/IP template).

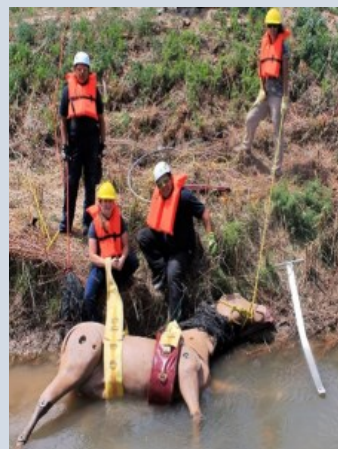
TRAINING SUCCESS STORY: NMSU-Co-Op

Course Code: Technical Large Animal Rescue (TLAR)

April 10-12, 2017

Description: The Southwest Border Food Protection and Emergency Preparedness Center coordinated a three-day Technical Large Animal Rescue (TLAR) awareness training on April 10-12 in Las Cruces and an advanced course on April 14 in Socorro as part of our EMPG funding.

The classroom and practical training provided an opportunity for emergency management animal rescue personnel, New Mexico State University Agricultural Consumer, and Environmental Sciences (cooperative extension) personnel, firefighters, animal control officers, veterinarians and private industry personnel to train and exercise together before an actual emergency.



Participants learned practical considerations, behavioral understanding, specialty equipment usage, techniques, methodologies, swift water rescue skills and tactics behind the safe extrication of a live, large animal in peril.

Little did some of the participants know, they would be utilizing these acquired skills soon after the training concluded. Only ten days after the training, Socorro County Emergency Managers had to rescue a young bull trapped in a hole for 3-4 days. While using the training skills and heavy equipment the bull survived.
